The Hagley Museum and Library and the Department of History at the University of Delaware offer a two- and four-year course of study leading to an M.A. or Ph.D. degree for students interested in careers as college teachers or as professionals in museums and historical agencies. The Hagley Program's focus is the history of industrialization, broadly defined. Students study social, labor, business, and economic history and the history of science and technology. Historically, most students in the program have been interested in American industrial history, but the program also covers the industrialization of Europe. Some Hagley Fellows have prepared fields in the modernization of Asia. The Hagley Museum and Library, whose collections are predominantly American-related, provides students with unique opportunities to do primary research and gain archival experience in manuscript, imprint, pictorial, and artifact collections, and to study, observe, and experience museum work firsthand. For students pursuing careers as museum professionals, the University of Delaware sponsors a certificate program in museum studies.

Hagley Fellowships cover tuition for courses at the University of Delaware and provide a yearly stipend of \$8170 for master's candidates and \$9050 for doctoral candidates. Fellowships may be renewed once for those seeking a terminal master's degree and three times beyond the initial year for those seeking the doctorate. Hagley Fellows also receive support for travel to conferences, archives, and museums, provided by the Hagley Program Alumni Association.

Application for a Hagley Fellowship can be made through the Associate Coordinator, Hagley Program, Department of History, University of Delaware, Newark, DE 19716, (302) 451-8226. The deadline for receipt of complete applications is February 1.

The Oberlin College Archives will award three grants of up to \$1000 to cover travel and expenses related to research of scholars and independent researchers using the archives and special collection holdings. Funded through the Oberlin Historical and Improvement Organization of Oberlin, Ohio, the Frederick B. Artz Summer Research Grants Program is in its first year. The archives' holdings include the permanently valuable records of the institution as well as those of individuals, families and organizations affiliated with Oberlin College and/or the town of Oberlin. Included are materials on movements with which Oberlin has been associated, such as antislavery, black education, coeducation, missions and temperance. There are 280 manuscript collections as well as records of local governments. Among the wide variety of materials in Special Collections are Antislavery books and pamphlets, Oberliniana and the Goodkind/Violin Society of America Collection of material related to string instruments. The holdings are rich for the study of liberal arts education in the U.S. For application materials, write to Roland M. The Friends of the New Netherland Project is the recipient of an endowment from Friends' member Andrew A. Hendricks of North Carolina, whose avocation is the history of New Netherland. Income from the endowment is used to promote and stimulate research in the area of New Netherland studies by offering an annual prize of at least \$1000 for the best published or unpublished manuscript focusing on any aspect of the Dutch colonial experience in North America.

Entries must be based on research completed or published within two years prior to first submission. Manuscripts may deal with any aspect of New Netherland are eligible, as are manuscripts dealing with such cultural matters as literature and the arts, provided that in such cases the methodology is historical. Edited collections of articles that meet the above criteria are eligible; however, works of fiction and works of article length are not eligible. The successful entry should be well written, adequately researched and documented, follow accepted scholarly standards, and contribute to the scholarship in the field.

Three ribbon copies or clear, readable photocopies should be submitted on or before December 1, 1989 with a letter of intent to enter the contest. The prize winner, selected by a four-member panel of scholars, will be selected by the end of May 1990. The prize will be given at an awards ceremony in conjunction with the Rensselaerswyck Seminar in September 1990.
