PAUL F. CLARK is an Associate Professor of Labor Studies and Industrial Relations at the University Park Campus of Penn State University. For the last 12 years, he has worked in the Department's labor education program, providing educational services to workers and unions in Western Pennsylvania. He is the recipient of an M.S. in Industrial and Labor Relations from Cornell University and a Ph.D. in Public Administration from the University of Pittsburgh. He has published books on the United Mine Workers and the United Steelworkers unions and his articles have appeared in numerous journals including the *Industrial and Labor Relations Review*, *Industrial Relations Journal*, and *Labor Studies Journal*.

IRWIN MARCUS is a professor of history at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He has written extensively on coal miners and steel workers in Western Pennsylvania. His articles have appeared in *Labor History*, *The Western Pennsylvania Historical Magazine*, the *Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, and *Pennsylvania History*.

CHARLES MCCOLLESTER is the Associate Director of the Pennsylvania Center for the Study of Labor Relations at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He received a Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Louvain in 1970. He worked as a machinist in Pittsburgh and was elected Chief Steward with UE Local 610 at the Union Switch and Signal in Swissvale, Pennsylvania. He left the Switch in 1986 as it was closing. *Labor's Heritage* will publish his article on "The Great Westinghouse Strike of 1914" later this year.

MARK MCCOLLOCH is Associate Professor of History at the University of Pittsburgh's Greensburg campus. He received a Ph.D. in U.S. Labor History from the University of Pittsburgh in 1975. His recent publications include *White Collar Labor in Transition: The Boom Years, 1940-70* (1983), "The Case of the Silent Furnaces," in *Pennsylvania History*, July 1989, and the forthcoming "Glory Days: 1941-1970," in *A History of Labor in Pennsylvania*.

CARL I. MEYERHUBER, JR., completed his graduate degrees in history at the University of Michigan and the University of California, San Diego. Meyerhuber teaches at Penn State's New Kensington Campus, near Pittsburgh. His special interests include the emergence of modern industrial America, the evolution of the corporation, and the rise and decline of industrial unionism. His research has focused on the aluminum, coal, and steel industries in Western Pennsylvania and the labor unions that organized their workers.
