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ARTHUR SCHERR is a former assistant editor of the *Diary of Elizabeth Drinker*, and has served on the staffs of the Papers of Robert Morris and Alexander Hamilton. His articles have appeared in such journals as *Mid-America*, *The South Carolina Historical Magazine*, *Eighteenth-Century Life*, *Midwest Quarterly*, and *The American Journal of Psychoanalysis*. He has taught at Baruch College of the City University of New York and at Kingsborough Community College, Brooklyn, as well as in the New York City public schools.

THOMAS P. SLAUGHTER, professor of history at Rutgers University, is completing a study of *The Natures of John and William Bartram* to be published by Knopf in fall, 1996. He is also editing *The Writings and Travels of William Bartram* which the Library of America is publishing next year. He has previously written *The Whiskey Rebellion: Frontier Epilogue to the American Revolution* (1986) and *Bloody Dawn: The Christiana Riot and Racial Violence in the Ante-Bellum North* (1991).

MARK THISTLETHWAITE, guest curator at the Peter Rothermel Exhibition at the Brandywine River Museum in Chadds Ford (Sept. 9-Nov. 19, 1995), holds the Kay and Velma Kimball Chair in Art History at Texas Christian University. He is the author (with William H. Gerdts) of *Grand Illusions: History Painting in America* and of *The Image of George Washington: Studies in Mid-Nineteenth-Century American History Painting*.

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SERGEI ZHUK, professor of history at the University of Dniepropetrovsk in the Ukraine, has been a visiting Fulbright Fellow at the Philadelphia Center for Early American Studies and a Fellow at the Huntington and John Carter Brown Libraries. His 1987 dissertation from the Institute of General History at the USSR Academy of Sciences has been published as *The Social Contradictions in the Colony of New York, 1664-1712*.
