RICHARD D. WHITE, the Marjory B. Ourso Excellence in Teaching Professor at Louisiana State University, received his Ph.D. in Public Administration from The Pennsylvania State University. Dr. White has published in numerous scholarly journals, including *Public Administration Review*, *Policy Studies Review*, *Journal of Public Administration Research and Theory*, *Public Integrity*, *Journal of Management History*, and *Commonwealth: A Journal of Political Science*. His book, *Roosevelt the Reformer: Theodore Roosevelt as Civil Service Commissioner, 1889-1895*, was recently published by the University of Alabama Press.

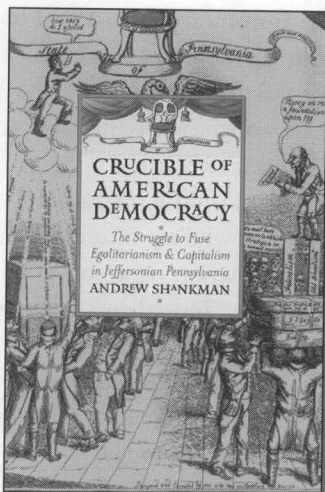

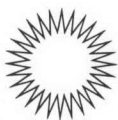
