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CONTRIBUTORS

PAUL DOUGLAS NEWMAN is the Editor of *Pennsylvania History: A Journal of Mid-Atlantic Studies* and the author of *Fries's Rebellion: The Enduring Struggle for the American Revolution*. He is professor of History at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown.

WILLIAM PENCAK, Professor of History at Penn State University, edited *Pennsylvania History* from 1994 to 2002 and was the founding editor of *Explorations in Early American Culture* in 1997, which is now *Early American Studies*, the Journal of the McNeil Center for Early American Studies. He has edited/co-edited several books on Pennsylvania History for Penn State Press, including *Pennsylvania: History of a Commonwealth* (2002) with Randall Miller. His latest book, *Jews and Gentiles in Early America, 1654–1800* (University of Michigan Press, 2005) was runner up for the National Book Award in American Jewish History.

JOHN F. BAUMAN is Research Professor of Community Planning and Development at the Muskie School of Public Policy, University of Southern Maine and was Professor of History, California University of Pennsylvania. He has published numerous books, articles and historical reports and has recently completed a book with Edward K. Muller of the University of Pittsburgh, entitled *Before Renaissance: Urban Planning in Pittsburgh (Pennsylvania), 1880–1943*.

RANDALL M. MILLER is the William Dirk Warren '50 Sesquicentennial Chair and Professor of History at Saint Joseph's University. He is the author or editor of more than 20 books, including *Pennsylvania: A History of the Commonwealth* (Penn State Press, 2002), which he co-edited with William Pencak. His most recent book, co-authored, is *Unto a Good Land: A History of the American People* (Eerdmans, 2005).

ROSALIND REMER taught early American history at Moravian College for fourteen years and is now executive director of the Benjamin Franklin Tercentenary and a public history and museum consultant.

LESLIE PATRICK is Associate Professor and Chair of the History Department at Bucknell University. She wishes to thank Laura Leviski (Bucknell, 2008) for her expert research assistance.

SUSAN E. KLEPP is professor of history at Temple University where she is also affiliated professor of Women's Studies and of African American Studies.

PENNSYLVANIA HISTORY

She has written books and articles on population, society and culture in the eighteenth-century Mid-Atlantic region.

CHARLES D. CASHDOLLAR is President of the Pennsylvania Historical Association. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania and is Professor of History Emeritus at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. Among his publications are *The Transformation of Theology: Positivism and Protestant Thought in Britain and America, 1830–1890* (1989); *A Spiritual Home: Life in British and American Reformed Congregations, 1830–1915* (2000); and *Let All Give Thanks: A Bicentennial History of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Indiana, Pennsylvania* (2008).

JOHN B. FRANTZ joined the history department at Penn State University in 1961 and remained in that position until 1998. While at Penn State, he became business secretary of the Pennsylvania Historical Association in 1998 and served until 2006. He has chaired or co-chaired local arrangements committee for the annual convention in 1967, 1984, 1996, and 2007. Frantz has served on the Association's council and executive committee, and was vice-president and president of the PHA. He is the editor and co-editor of several books and author of numerous articles published in such journals as *William and Mary Quarterly*, *Yearbook of German American-American Studies*, *Pennsylvania History*, and the *Journal of the Pennsylvania German Society*.

SYLVESTER K. STEVENS, President of the Pennsylvania Historical Association, 1948–51, was State Historian of Pennsylvania, and, from 1956–72, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. He was the author of many books on Pennsylvania history, including *Pennsylvania: Birthplace of a Nation* (1964).

HOMER T. ROSENBERGER was the past President of the Pennsylvania Historical Association from 1967 to 1969. He is the author of *The Pennsylvania Germans, 1891–1965* (1966). His history of the PHA first appeared in *Pennsylvania History* in 1970 Vol. 37 No.1.

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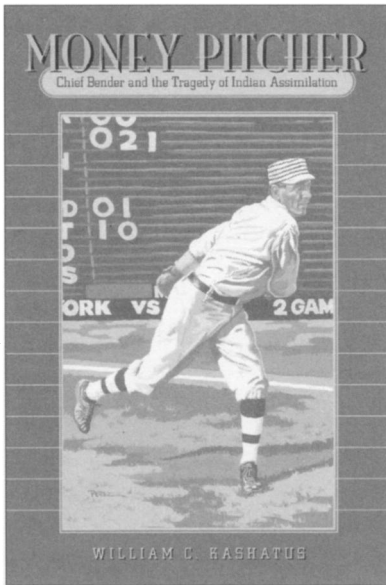

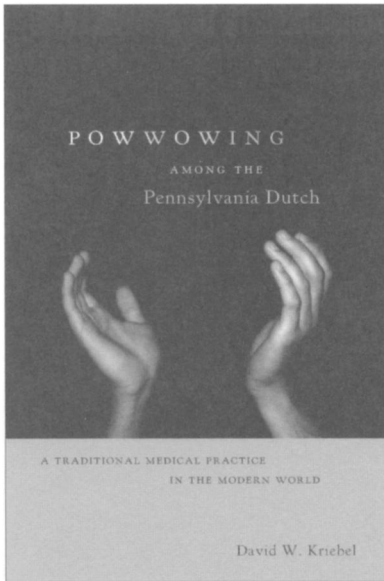
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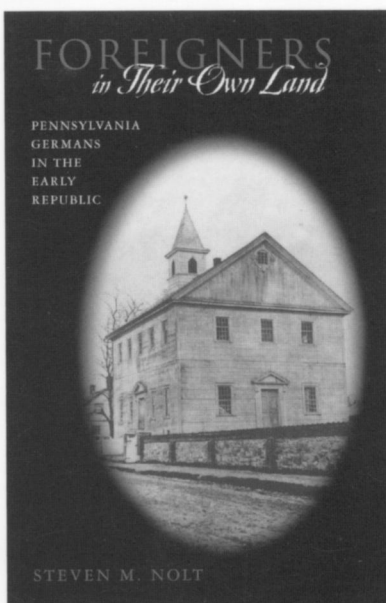
