FROM THE EDITOR

This will be my last issue as editor. In July, quite unexpectedly, I was named to an administrative post at my university. It is an extremely time- and attention-consuming position. It has been my pleasure to serve the Association on the editorial staff of *Pennsylvania History* since 1999, when my name first appeared as the book review editor for the Autumn 1999 issue—eleven and a half years if anyone is counting! In that time I have had the great joy of meeting and collaborating with hundreds of fine historians and regular people. Jeff Davis, who will also be stepping down as associate editor after five and one-half years, has been a tremendous asset and a terrific source of collegiality and friendship.
