## VALLEY FORGE.

The Historical Society of Pennsylvania has recently acquired the papers of John Chaloner, Commissary of Purchases to Washington's army, comprising Letter Books, Receipt Books, Muster Rolls, and a voluminous correspondence connected with his department. These very valuable papers cover the period between the later part of 1777 and the capture of Lord Cornwallis' forces at Yorktown. As a whole, they develop a better knowledge of the workings of this important department than other Revolutionary papers in the collections of the Society or elsewhere. Washington's orders for the movement of his army from Valley Forge on the evacuation of Philadelphia by the British army, and a few other documents, have been selected for publication.

The Disposition for the Baggage of the Army to be as follows.

The Commander in Chief's Baggage is to follow Lord Stirling's Division—The Adjutant Gen¹—Pay Master Gen¹—Muster Master Gen¹—Auditors of accompts—Gen¹ Offr³ of the Division—Baggage of the Division—Waggons of the Qr Mr Gen¹ Department—Military Stores—Flying Hospital next & lastly the Commissary & Forage Master Gen¹s. The Waggons of the other Divisions to follow the Division in order following—The Gen¹ Offr³ in front of the Columns of Waggons next to the troops the Regimental baggage & tents—Qr Mr Gen¹s Stores belonging to the Brigades, Commissary Stores & lastly the Forage Waggons—

The Gen<sup>1</sup> Off<sup>rs</sup> Commanding the Grand division to appoint such Guards upon the Baggage as shall be necessary for the security thereof. They will also

appoint a party of Pioneers to move in front of the Columns to assist the Artificers in repairing Bridges & bad places in the Roads.

There will be a party of Artificers to go in front and Rear of each Grand Division to mend Bridges & repair broken Carriages which will take their orders from the Commanding Officers of the Divisions.

Received May 14, 1778 of Baron Stewben four horses into the Continental Yard all Branded C. A. Camp Valey Forge Alex. Church.

Please to deliver to the Bearer the best riding Horse in the Yard, to be taken to Head Quarters for a Member of Congress to ride to York Town.

Twenty two Horses herewith sent from Col. R. L. Hooper to be delivered to Mr. James Thompson Waggon Master Gen¹ who will give a Receipt for them. If Baron Steuben is not yet supplied, let him have his choice of these. The rest for the Artillery & Teams.

Head Quarters 3d June 1778.

Sir.

His Excellency desires me to acquaint you that if Tomkins could produce Col. Hendricks original discharge it would avail him nothing—as a Colonel has no right to give discharges to any but men who from some bodily infirmity or defect are clearly unfit for service—and the doing it even in these cases has only been allowed to save delay and trouble—however as Tomkins appears to be under peculiar circumstances,

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and you say the business of your department would be prejudiced by his immediate removal, His Excellency consents to your detaining him in the capacity in which he has hitherto been employed under you, 'till another can be provided, and the fact of his discharge investigated.

Am order'd by his Excellency Gen' Washington and Committee of Congress on a tour of four Hundred Miles. Congress is very Pressing for a statement of our Acct—as soon as you arrive here you will begin to regulate my Acct, take Possession of two Rooms in old Mr. Pawlings and so soon as the Bridge is finished move there, the first thing is to regulate the Acct, the Cattle delivered to the sundry Divisions, Brigades, and Detachments of the Army this done and as soon as you receive a regular sett of Books from me, you will prepare them for opening proper Acct against each purchaser—these books will forward to you by very first opportunity and am D' Sir
