Dr. Lisa Frehill has been an Assistant Professor of Sociology at New Mexico State University since 1993. Prior to coming to NMSU, she earned M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Sociology, with a minor in Systems Engineering, at the University of Arizona. She received her bachelors degree in Industrial Engineering from General Motors Institute (now Kettering University) in Flint, Michigan.

Dr. Frehill's research and teaching interests are in the area of race, class, and gender with an emphasis on how these factors affect occupational and educational attainment. Her research makes use of both quantitative and qualitative methods. One current project is an analysis of institutional forces affecting women's success in engineering in college and in the labor force. Another project is a history of Quindaro, an African American community near Kansas City, Kansas that uses archival and census documents and oral histories of long-time community residents.
