

The manuscript must be typed double-spaced (pica type preferred), with footnotes double-spaced at the end. It should not exceed 30 pages. Persons wishing to review books should submit a vita indicating fields of interest and current position. Recent Ph.D.s and graduate students are particularly encouraged to contribute. Unsolicited reviews will not be accepted. The Society does not assume responsibility for statements made by contributors.
