

The History Center is wheelchair-accessible, and a limited number of wheelchairs are available for use by patrons who require assistance. Restrooms are located on the first, second, third, and sixth floors. Baby care facilities are available on the first and third floors. Pay telephones are on the first floor.

Stages in History:

The History Center's resident theater program helps museum visitors better understand the human dimension of the past. Historical characters are portrayed by actors who appear throughout History Center exhibits to interact with visitors.

Museum Shop:

An award-winning Museum Shop offers a unique selection of items which include books, jewelry, ethnic crafts, and historic reproductions.

Cafe:

Reymer's Cafe seats 80 in the Great Hall and offers snacks, light lunches, beverages, and desserts.
