Meyersdale Public Library

It all started with a roll of microfilm....

In 2018, Meyersdale Public Library staff and volunteers undertook a historical newspaper preservation project. They had no idea at the time of the story that would unfold before them.

As volunteer Linda Marker sat down to review the resulting *Meyersdale Commercial* newspaper images preserved on film, she spotted a small "Suffrage Meeting" article on page five of the very first issue, dated March 20, 1913. Time spent combing through the library's archives and its collections, including those newly preserved newspapers, revealed that Somerset County had been home to an

SUFFRAGE MEETING.

The first Woman Suffrage meeting ever held in Meyersdale took place last Friday in the Kendall building on Centre street, when about 25 women were addressed by Mrs. Alice Kiernan, of Somerset. After the meeting an Equal Suffrage club was formed by the election of the following officers: Mrs. Frank B. Black, president; Mrs. Frank Hoffman, vice president; Mrs. F. B. Thomas, Secretary-Treasnrer. Quite a number joined the club, and much activity is promised.

Women such as county suffragist leader Alice Kiernan and Meyersdale activist Flora Snyder Black led frequent meetings, welcomed the Justice Bell to their county as part of a statewide effort to garner support for a 1915 Pennsylvania suffrage referendum, and organized a 1916 gathering of some 700 women for the dedication of the state's suffrage flag at Alice's home outside of Somerset.

As the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment granting American women the right to vote approached, the library dedicated itself to sharing the story of those local women who had once worked to ensure a voice at the ballot box for themselves and the generations to come. With the help of Meyersdale Area School District art students and community volunteers, their efforts culminated in the creation of the library's own Justice Bell replica and "Salute to Somerset County Suffragists" march in the 74th annual Pennsylvania Maple Festival Grand Feature Parade during spring 2021.

Today, images of those brittle century-old *Meyersdale Commercial* newspapers are not only preserved on film, but also publicly available online inside the Pennsylvania Newspaper Archive. The story of "Alice, Flora, and Their Friends" discovered within their pages continues to be shared by the library.

The frustration and disappointment that Alice Kiernan and countless others experienced in their unceasing struggle to give everyone a voice on Election Day provides historical evidence that life is often difficult and unjust. We may find ourselves still struggling; yet we are reminded that hope and courage for a more equitable world must always endure. Alice, Flora, and friends worked hard to enact change. Now, a century later, we can both honor their struggle and give voice to justice by voting.
