A Forgotten Regiment in a Forgotten War
1812-1815

PART II

DURING a long lifetime, one witnesses many vivid scenes and spectacles, some fading in the mist of memories while others remain sharp even after the lapse of scores of years. Many times too, a reader of history will try to visualize an impression of decades or millenniums past. Thus this writer has tried to imagine a boy between fourteen and fifteen, five feet tall, in line with men marching against the British forces at the Battle of Chippewa, New York, July 5, 1814. This boy, "Little John" Herron, gradually became a personal hero as the great-grandfather of the author's wife. As such he symbolizes local history and makes vivid the national history of the War of 1812.

"Little John" was born December 12, 1799, in Fayette County, Pennsylvania. He enlisted as a drummer at Uniontown for the duration, February 13, 1813, and was discharged at Sackett's Harbor, New York, May 24, 1815. His whole life seems to have been fascinating, not the least engaging part having been that of his wartime experiences with his regiment and company. Trying to pinpoint his military career after over one hundred and fifty years, we have constructed a chronological sequence of events involving the 22nd Regiment including "Little John's" portion of it, the company commanded by Captains John Foster and Thomas Lawrence.

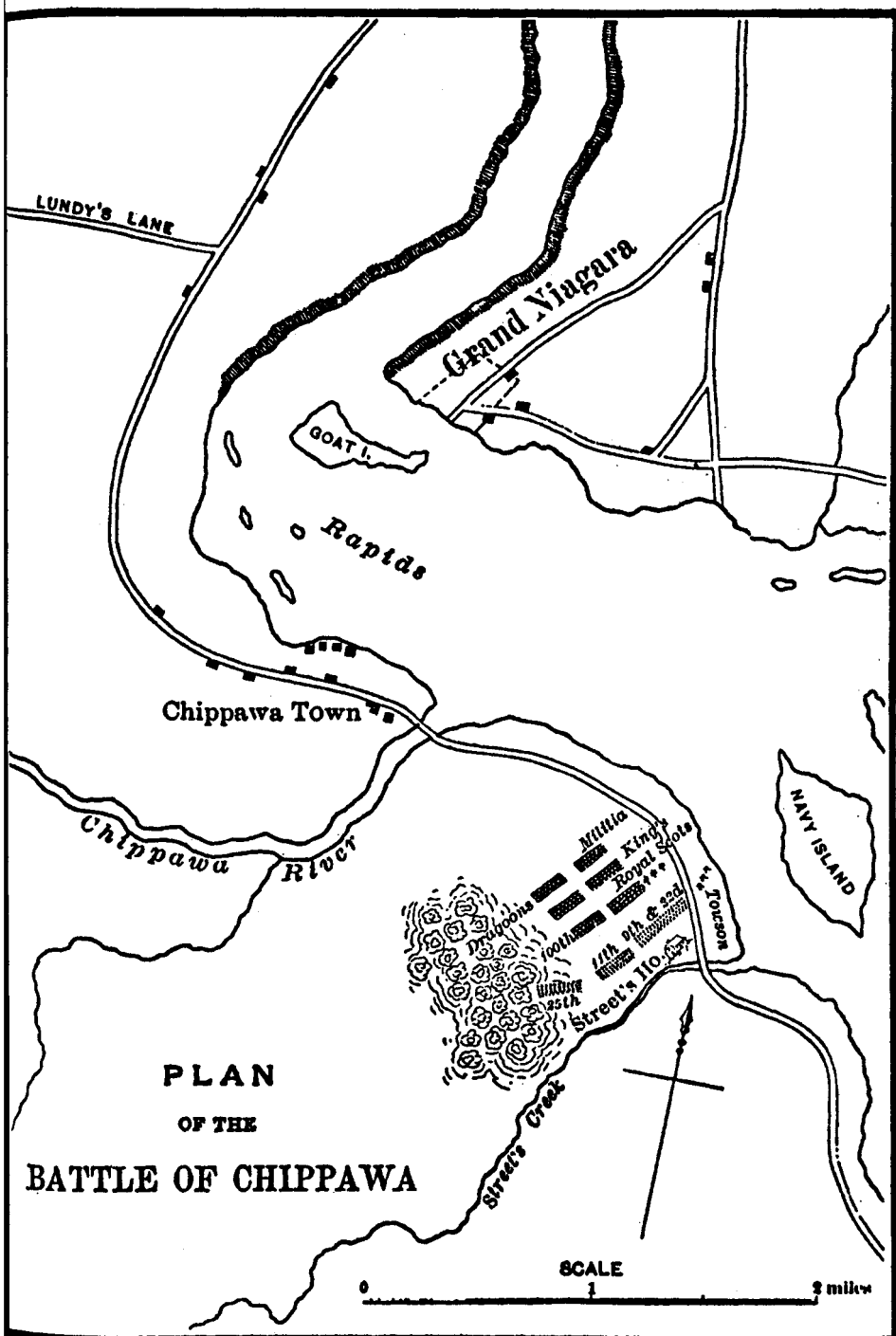
The written records of the War of 1812 are so confusing and conflicting that at times one abandons hope of reaching exactly true circumstances. This is not surprising when we recall the actual original paucity of written accounts, let alone their disappearance during the passage of time, but also remember the wide scattering of recruitment

centers, many points of assembly and the dispatching of various small bodies of troops to different localities during the war years.

THE COMPOSITE WRITTEN RECORD

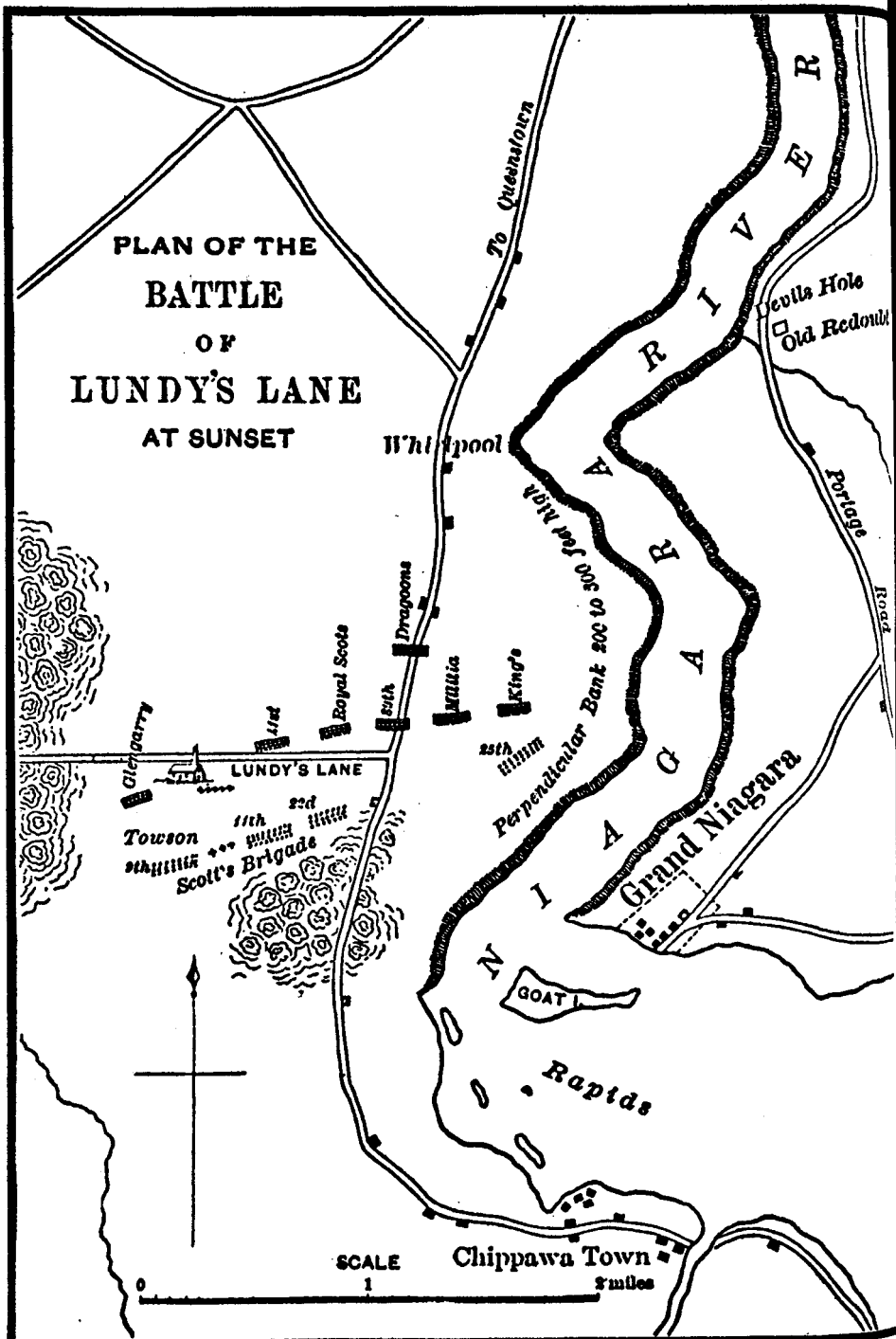
- June 6, 1812 Organization of the 22nd Regiment authorized by Act of Congress.^{16, 21} (Footnotes 1-49 in April issue of *WPHM*.)
- July 6, 1812 Colonel Hugh Brady commissioned.^{4, 16}
- July 6, 1812 Lieutenant Colonel George McFeeley of Cumberland County commissioned. In charge of recruiting at Carlisle Barracks.⁵⁰
- July 14, 1812 Colonel Brady accepted command.⁴
- August 16, 1812 John Patterson, from near Meadville, enlisted by Captain Foulk at Erie. About 130 men paraded twice a day at Fort Fayette.⁵¹
- September 28, 1812 Men from Fort Fayette arrived at Carlisle on way to Niagara Falls to join General Dearborn.⁵¹
- October 5, 1812 Lieutenant Colonel McFeeley with 200 men of the 22nd left Carlisle Barracks for Niagara frontier.⁵⁰
- October 15, 1812 The 22nd detachment arrived at Fort Niagara.⁵¹
- November 14, 1812 Lieutenant Colonel McFeeley relieved Colonel Winder of command at Fort Niagara.⁵⁰
- November 21, 1812 Detachment at bombardment of Fort Niagara by the British. The American garrison commanded by Lieutenant Colonel McFeeley. He also commanded at Battles of Fort George and Stony Creek.^{4, 21} Lieutenant Eli Thomas wounded in action. (National Archives hereinafter referred to as NA.)
- December 28, 1812 Francis Herron of Fayette County enrolled as sergeant in Captain Thomas Lawrence's company at Uniontown.⁴⁶
- February 13, 1813 John Herron, age 13, of Fayette County, enlisted as drummer boy in Captain Thomas Lawrence's company at Uniontown.⁴⁶
- March 31, 1813 According to Colonel Hugh Brady, 180 rank and file on line, 210 under marching orders at Carlisle at this time.^{NA}
- April, 1813 Colonel Brady opened a recruiting office at Meadville under Captain Jacob Carmack. \$40 offered as bounty, with three months' extra pay on discharge and warrant for 160 acres.⁵²
- May 27, 1813 Entire 22nd Regiment present at capture of Fort George, across the Niagara River from Fort Niagara on the Canadian side. The advance guard was under Colonel Winfield Scott with his regiment and included a detachment of the 22nd

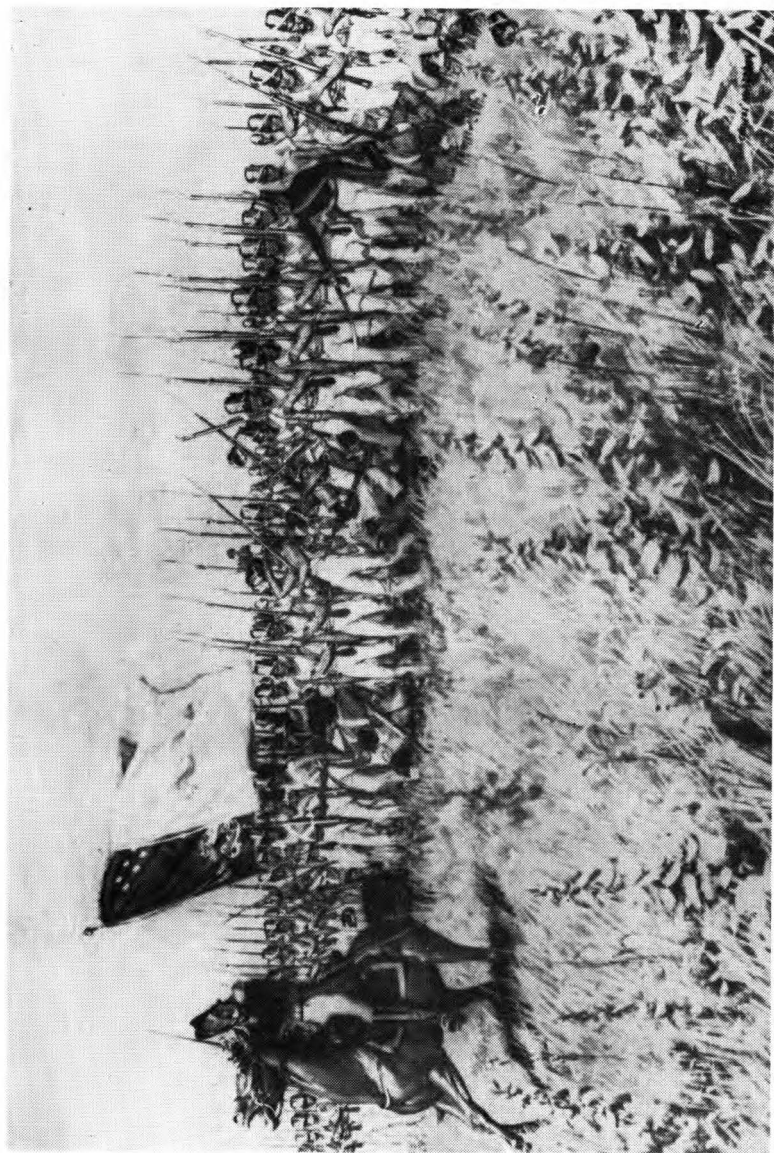


- under Lieutenant Colonel McFeeley. Commodore Perry joined and assisted Scott in his first attack.^{13, 16, 20}
- July 1, 1813 Surgeon Julius R. Shumate killed in action. Place unknown.²⁰
- July 6, 1813 Colonel Brady with 250 regulars and 50 horses expected at Buffalo.⁵³
- July 7, 1813 Brady directed to leave the company of cavalry and 50 men at Buffalo.⁵⁴
- July 15, 1813 Brady a signer of letter of regret to General Dearborn on retiring.⁵³
- September 20, 1813 Brady in attendance at Council of War at Fort George.⁵⁵
- September 22, 1813 Resignation of Captain John Foster accepted. Lieutenant Green has leave because of ill health.⁵⁵
- October 19-20, 1813 General Jacob Brown's brigade, including the 22nd, moved to Grenadier Island from Henderson Harbor — 18 miles below Sackett's Harbor, near outlet of Saint Lawrence. Was under General Wilkinson in Saint Lawrence campaign.⁵⁶
- October 29, 1813 Brown's brigade went down Canadian side of Saint Lawrence and took part in action at French Creek. Brown in command of advance near village of Clayton.⁵⁷
- November 1-2, 1813 Entire 22nd present at French Creek, where Brown's brigade repulsed a British naval sortie.^{57, 58}
- November 11, 1813 Brown's brigade not present at Battle at Crysler's Farm, when British defeated General Wilkinson at Cornwall.⁵⁷
- Late November, 1813 Wilkinson's army was idle at French Creek, near Canadian line, until February, 1814. Scott, with 800 men, defeated British at Hoophole Creek.⁵⁷
- December 1, 1813 22nd Regiment recorded as having 455 enlisted men, non-commissioned officers, artificers and musicians.⁵⁹
- December 19, 1813 Third Lieutenant James Steward taken prisoner at Lewiston.⁶⁰
- December, 1813, to January, 1814 Brown in winter quarters at French Mills, a few miles up Salmon River.⁶¹
- January 5, 1814 Troops at Fort Fayette to march to Erie on news of danger at Erie.⁶²
- February 13, 1814 General Brown marched from French Mills to Sackett's Harbor, then to Niagara, with his 2000 men including the 22nd.⁶³

- March 4, 1814 A company of militia under Captain Dunn left Fort Loudon for Erie, where it was put with the 5th Regiment of Pennsylvania militia. It reached Pittsburgh on March 17.⁶⁴
- March 24, 1814 General Scott formed Camp of Instruction at Buffalo, where training was from 7 to 10 hours daily.⁶⁵
- March 31, 1814 Captain Dunn's company reached Buffalo and later was at Battles of Chippewa and Lundy's Lane.⁶⁴
- April 3, 1814 Colonel Brady at Pittsburgh.^{NA}
- April 15, 1814 Lieutenant Colonel McFeeley appointed Colonel of 25th Regiment. Ninian Pinkney appointed Lieutenant Colonel of 22nd Regiment.⁶⁶
- May 27, 1814 Colonel Brady notified the 22nd is destined for Division of the Left under General Brown. Those parts at Pittsburgh and Philadelphia ordered to Buffalo. Major Martin, with all recruits at Erie, also moved to Buffalo.⁶⁷
- June 8, 1814 Brady wrote Adjutant General from Fort Fayette that Major Trimble of 19th Regiment requested to be attached to his (Brady's) command.^{NA}
- June 20, 1814 Brady wrote from Pittsburgh that Captain Reed would be in command there.⁶⁷
- June 22, 1814 John Patterson of Captain Dunn's company recorded arrival of Lieutenant Culbertson and 70 men of the 22nd at Erie.⁶⁴
- June, 1814 22nd Regiment, with 9th, 11th and 25th Regiments, assembled under General Scott at Buffalo.^{67, 68}
- July 2, 1814 General Jacob Brown authorized attack on Canada. General Scott assembled Colonels Campbell, Leavenworth and Jessup, Colonel Brady not having joined.⁶⁹
- July 3, 1814 Scott easily captured Fort Erie.⁶⁹
- July 5, 1814 Battle of Chippewa. Lieutenant Colonel Leavenworth in command of consolidated battalion of 9th and 22nd Regiments on right wing, thrown forward. Captain King of the 22nd was severely wounded.^{70, 71} (See *Pittsburgh Gazette*, July 29, 1814, and Erie correspondent in *Gazette*, July 15, 1814.)
- July 20, 1814 100 men of 22nd embarked at Erie for Buffalo on schooner *Porcupine*.⁷²
- July 25, 1814 Battle of Lundy's Lane. 9th and 22nd Regiments consolidated under Colonel Brady, deployed on left and, after Brady was badly wounded, consolidated with Leavenworth's.⁷³
- July 26, 1814 Scott, Brady and other wounded officers embarked for Buffalo.⁷⁴

July 31, 1814 The 22nd had 218 present for duty, a total of 418 present or absent.⁷⁵

August 7, 1814 British began siege of Fort Erie.

August 15, 1814 British began attack. Parts of 9th, 11th and 22nd posted on right under Lieutenant Colonel Aspinwall. Detachment from those under Captain Foster of the 11th charged through narrow passage, was often repulsed and failed. Detachment of 20 men of 22nd under Lieutenant John Brady aided.^{76, 77}

September 29, 1814 Colonel Brady in command at Buffalo with remains of 22nd Regiment.⁷⁸

February 4, 1815 Colonel Brady commanded troops at Sackett's Harbor, with about 400 regulars.⁷⁹

May 24, 1815 Francis Herron, sergeant of late Captain Thomas Lawrence's company, discharged. John Herron, private, son of Francis Herron, late Captain Lawrence's company, discharged, 15 years old, Major Martin commanding, 2nd Regiment Infantry.⁸⁰

1815-1825 Colonel Hugh Brady commander at Fort Pike, Sackett's Harbor.⁸¹

THE FOSTER-LAWRENCE COMPANY*

Major Ralph Marlin was in charge of recruiting at Pittsburgh early in the War of 1812, until he was ordered to Erie, February 4, 1814. Captain John Foster recruited in Uniontown, where our hero, "Little John" Herron, enlisted a few weeks after his father, Francis Herron, was enrolled as a sergeant, January 1, 1813. There exists the original of Foster's muster roll, dated May 31, 1813, showing the names of 129 officers and men registered for service and each paid eight dollars bounty up to that time.

We are unable to cite the exact date when this company went to the frontier. Colonel Brady at Pittsburgh, wrote to the Adjutant General's Office on March 31, 1813, reporting that there were 180 men rank and file then on the lines in the 22nd Regiment, but mentioning nothing to indicate the strength of Foster's company or where it was. However, it would appear likely that Foster and the soldiers of his command were among those who went with Colonel Brady to Buffalo in July 1813. Certainly, since the resignation of Captain John Foster was accepted at Buffalo, September 22, 1813, one is safe in assuming that the company was in Buffalo then. There is little ques-

tion that the group, under Thomas Lawrence, was with Scott and Brady when Wilkinson began his campaign to capture Montreal and that later they were among those whom Scott took to his Camp of Instruction at Buffalo. A muster and pay roll of Captain Lawrence covering the periods April 30, 1814, to October 4, 1814, substantiates this since it includes numerous men sick in the northeast, at Ogdensburg, Sackett's Harbor, Greenbush, Malone and even the Burlington Hospital in Vermont.

There are 148 names on the roll of October 4, 1814, but only 52 of them were on Foster's original list. The number on both rolls was 210. Also, of the 148 reported on October 4, 1814, only 31 men were present for duty. The roster of sick included: 25 at Sackett's Harbor, 5 Ogdensburg, 3 Greenbush, 2 Malone, 1 Burlington Hospital, 5 Niagara, 2 Buffalo, 1 Black Rock, 2 Williamsville, 8 Fort Fayette, 1 near Erie, 2 Uniontown — total 57.

It is difficult to "questimate" the actual number of men of Lawrence's company who went into the battles around Niagara, but it would likely be between 51 and 106. The 106 counts all those sick at Sackett's Harbor, October 4, 1814, as being on duty — an unlikely probability. We must bear in mind that the total for the 22nd as of June 30 present for duty was 229.

His army and battle experiences must have had a strong effect on the character of "Little John." Various records list him as drummer, fifer and private. He was on some special duty (just what is not recorded) for a while and never is noted as being absent. Returning to Fayette County, Pennsylvania, and still following in his father's footsteps (as a cordwainer), he became a shoemaker. In 1816 he was awarded a 160-acre land bounty in what now is Missouri, but no record has been found of its disposition.

Without doubt, "Little John" had great affection for his father. He remained in Fayette County with his wife, Mary Gamble, and their son Milton, until about 1833, when it is believed his father died. Next, he submerged for some years in Ohio to surface in Blue Earth County, Minnesota, in 1856, when there was a real estate boom to populate

the Minnesota River Valley. In Jamestown Township, a few miles from Mankato, he was the pioneer settler, establishing a trading post a short distance from the Winnebago Indian Reservation, where local history catches him. The Minnesota Census does not mention his wife, but it does list four daughters, all native to Ohio. One of his girls — Sarah — married William Drury at Saint Peter in 1856.

In the winter of 1858-1859 "Little John" Herron was involved in a neighborhood tragedy. Some Winnebago, having been drinking in Saint Peter, stopped at his trading establishment on their way back to their reservation, obtained more liquor, became quarrelsome and in the ensuing melee one of them was killed with a hatchet by "Little John." What followed threatened to be a war between the Indians and the whites. "Little John" was one of the signers of a petition to President James Buchanan to have the Winnebago reservation moved — which was done.⁸²

Not long afterward "Little John" and his family moved to Holt County, Missouri. Subsequently they were at Cawker City, Kansas, for a while. Then they returned to Holt County and were domiciled at Mound City, where John's son Milton lived. In 1871 "Little John" was granted a pension for his services in the War of 1812, and the pension records state that he was still alive but somewhat childish in 1888. His grave is in the lot of his son-in-law, William Drury, in the New Liberty Baptist Church Cemetery in Holt County, Missouri.

John Herron was not an historical figure except perhaps in the sense that any non-prominent, non-affluent ordinary citizen is historical. But he represents those restless Americans of more than a century ago who migrated over the land to settle it. Having seen some of the beautiful farming terrain where he lived, one wonders what continually drove him farther. He may not have been a pioneer in the full sense of the word, but he was an independent second-generation American out to make his own way. Now he rests on a small hill overlooking lovely country.
